

Communication in Marriage

- Good communication in the Christian marriage does not happen automatically.
 - Neither is the Christian marriage immune from problems. Why?
 - Because you and your spouse are sinners.
 - Because you and your spouse are finite with sinful hearts.
 - Because your heart has various cravings and desires that conflict.

Communication in Marriage

- 2. Good marriages and loving relationships can be built by couples who are committed to being God's kind of husband and wife.
 - If you take to heart biblical principles of communication, your marriage can begin improving today.
 - But you must be sincere in your desire to do things God's way. This means He defines what is best for your marriage, not you! Turn to <u>Ephesians 4:25-32</u>.

Communication in Marriage

• The preceding context is important to properly understanding our text!

• Ephesians 4:17-24

You have certain lifestyle patterns that must be put off and new lifestyle patterns to be put on.

 Permanent change in the Christian life is always two-factored.



Be Honest! (Ephesians 4:25)

- A. Speak!
 - Greek imperative— "you speak up" (lalei ▼te)
 - 2. People cannot read your mind.
 - 3. Clamming up is out for the Christian!
- c. Speak truth!
 - Speaking the truth is a verb that involves continuous action (present tense).
 - It is to be your new lifestyle in your marriage.
 - David says you must speak the truth from a heart of integrity (Psalm 15:2). Not deceptively, or with disguised, hidden or double meanings.


Four Rules of Communication

- Examples of the way you may be dishonest in your speech:
 - a. Outright dishonesty—a deliberate lie, falsification or denial of truth.
 - b. Incongruencies—where your speech is inconsistent with your "halo" data (non-verbal behavior)
 - c. Disguised communication—innuendos, insinuations, implied accusations
- 4. Honest is more than not lying—it is being open and honest with the truth.
- 5. It is an attitude of the heart.
- "Do not lie to one another, since you laid aside the old self with its evil practices." (Colossians 3:9)

- c. Speak the truth lovingly! (cf. 4:15)
 - 1. Sometimes you can be brutal with the truth.
 - a. If you speak the truth in spite and anger.
 - b. If you speak without forethought concerning the person you are speaking to or about.
 - 3. Christians are to speak the truth with the other person's best interest in mind.
 - "Let your speech always be with grace, seasoned, as it were, with salt, so that you may know how you should respond to each other." (Colossians 4:6)

Four Rules of Communication

- Keep current! (4:26, 27)
 - A. Be angry and sin not!
 - All anger is not sin, self-centered anger is.



- 1. Guilty of sin!
- 2. Opening the way to resentment and bitterness.
- 3. Distorting subsequent problems.
- 4. Endangering your physical relationship.

Attack the problem, not the person! (4:29-30)

Unwholesome words

- Zero in on the person and their character
- Tear down and demolish
- "You always...", "you never...", "you turkey," "you idiot," "you dummy," "stupid," "dumb bell"
- We tend to label only *curse words* as unwholesome
 —a very narrow definition.
- God's definition is much broader.

Four Rules of Communication

в. Edifying words

- These are the words that focus on the problem.
- They are selected in order to make it easy for two people to find a solution. They are solution-oriented words—full of graciousness.
- They always have your partner's welfare first and foremost on your mind.
- "I disagree with what you have done, but I am open to hear your side of the story."
- "I want to find a solution to our problem that will be best for you and our home."
- "I want to work through this with you so that Jesus Christ is honored in our marriage."

N. Act, don't react! (4:31-32)

- A. Reactions to problems (v. 31)
 - Bitterness—perpetual animosity that leads to harsh and unloving opinions about others.
 - Wrath—outbursts of passionate rage
 - 3. **Anger**—a subtle deep-flowing anger
 - 4. Clamor—outcry and shouting
 - Slander—speaking evil of another that often comes from some settled indignation.
 - Malice—a general wishing of ill-will toward another person, the root of all above vices.

Four Rules of Communication

- B. Actions (v. 32)
 - Be kind—useful, worthy, good, benevolent toward your spouse.



- Tender-hearted—lit. "having healthy bowels," in the Bible they are the seat of emotions and intention, therefore it means being compassionate with your partner.
- 3. **Forgiving**—to exercise grace in releasing the offense of your spouse. This includes the willingness from the heart (Mk. 11:25) and the verbal granting of forgiveness when repentance has taken place (Lk. 17:3-4).

A. The Biblical View

- Sexual relationships should be regular and continuous.
 - 1 Corinthians 7:5
 - Four guidelines in not having sex:
 - a. Mutual agreement
 - b. Agreed upon time
 - c. Fasting and prayer
 - d. Terminate and start again
